SUMMARY OF MEETING:

Industry representatives indicated that while much of the proposed children's sleepwear regulation was acceptable, that the infant sizes should be defined as zero to 12 months, rather than zero to six months. They also indicated that there needs to be some tolerance for shrinkage of cotton. They indicated that a 5% tolerance was acceptable to industry. Additionally, industry representatives pointed out that the garments allowed under the stay of enforcement are less strict, in terms of having to meet specific tight-fitting requirements, than the garments that would be allowed under the stay. CPSC staff acknowledged that that was indeed the case.
