SUMMARY OF MEETING: Mike Steinwachs, subcommittee chair and task group lead, conducted the meeting. The task group (TG):

- 1. Discussed the updated data provided by CPSC staff to the subcommittee during the May meeting showing increase in fatalities from 9 to 17 for the reporting period of 2008 to 2017.**
- 2. Discussed how can the standard be changed to address the fatalities.**

3. Discussed if 6.3.1 should be changed to make restraints required as opposed to optional? Keeping in mind that hammocks are included in this standard and is it possible to have a restraint in a hammock? Also, should the restraint include shoulder straps? Currently standard specifically says, shoulder straps are not allowed. TG agreed that shoulder straps should not be allowed. This will be presented to the subcommittee at the next meeting (TBD).

4. Discussed if restraints should always be available even if padding is removed. TG talked about if padding is removed for washing and then how is the product designed to ensure that the padding is put back on the product without covering the restraints. No clear answer, but TG will keep pursuing.

5. Discussed the warnings currently in the standard. The restraints are mentioned in the fall hazard but not the suffocation hazard. TG discussed variety of suggestions. Eric Childs is going to mock up some wording and share with the task group. One issue is trying to make it clear to consumers that the statement to stop using the product when the child starts to roll over, does not mean rolling over in the product necessarily, but the child's ability to roll over anywhere. TG acknowledged that was a difficult concept to put on a warning label.

6. Discussed visibility of the warning. TG agrees the rolling over and suffocation message should be a separate and prominent warning. Mike Steinwachs suggests using the wording in the Bouncer final rule. The warning must be visible on the front of the product anywhere above armpit level of the cami dummy sitting in the bouncer.

7. Eric Child and Mike Steinwachs are going to work together to create some examples/suggestions and will share at the next subcommittee meeting.

8. Next subcommittee meeting will be a conference call sometime this summer.
