Task 12: Review Literature to Develop New Estimates of Valuing the Prevention of Child Fatalities

CONTRACT TYPE

This is a task issued against CPSC-D15-0004

A. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

1. A legislative mandate gives the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) regulatory authority and enforcement powers over a wide range of consumer products. To carry out its mission effectively, the CPSC requires policy-relevant data and analyses to assess the consequences of product-related injuries and deaths, to estimate the costs and benefits of its programs and activities, and, thus, to allocate both its own and society's limited resources efficiently. The Consumer Product Safety Act requires Section 9 findings for regulations under this act, which must show a reasonable relationship between the benefits and costs of proposed actions.
2. The benefits of CPSC actions often consist of reductions in fatalities and for benefit-cost analysis a dollar valuation must be placed on statistical lives. Projects such as the portable generator project and the window cord project are currently using a valuation of \$8.7 million (2014 dollars) for assessing the benefits of preventing fatalities, and fatality prevention makes up the bulk of the potential benefits for both these projects.
3. Protecting vulnerable populations, especially infants and small children has historically been a major emphasis of the CPSC. For example section 104 of the Consumer Product Safety Improvement Act of 2008 ("CPSIA") is primarily devoted to protecting children under the age of five by improving and mandating voluntary standards for durable nursery products. The CPSIA also requires third party testing of products intended for children.
4. Thus, society appears to place a high value on reducing risks to infants and small children. Currently, however, CPSC applies a single value of a statistical life (VSL) to value mortality risk reductions, regardless of the characteristics of the individuals affected by the regulatory intervention. Existing literature suggests that willingness to pay to reduce risks experienced by children may be higher than for other individuals.

B. OBJECTIVES

The contractor shall be responsible for conducting a systematic review of the literature to identify studies estimating a VSL for children. The contractor shall first develop a set of relevant criteria for selecting the studies, and then identify and review relevant studies. The contractor shall also evaluate different age cutoffs for the analysis. The results will include either a specific

VSL for children or one or more multipliers (for different age groups, e.g., 0-4, 5-9, etc.) to be applied to the adult VSL. The review, along with our results and recommendations, will be documented in a report.

C. DELIVERY OR PERFORMANCE

The period of performance is seven months from the date of the award of the task. The Contractor shall appoint a lead program manager with overall responsibility for performance under the contract. The lead program manager shall be the single point of interface with the government for all matters concerning technical progress and problems, performance, schedule, resources, and other work-related matters.

The following items shall be performed or delivered in accordance with the following schedule:

CPSC staff shall provide comments on all draft plans and reports within two weeks and final reports within three weeks.
