Record of Commission Actions Commissioners Voting By Ballot Placed in the Record at Open Commission Meeting June 2, 1994

At the June 2, 1994, meeting of the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, the staff briefed the Commission on options for action to address risks of injury and death associated with baby bath rings and seats. Chairman Ann Brown provided introductory remarks as set forth in the attachment. No decisions were made.

Chairman Ann Brown convened today's meeting. Commissioner Mary Sheila Gall was present. Commissioner Jacqueline Jones-Smith was not present.

<u>Ballot Vote Decisions</u>. The following decisions made by ballot vote of the Commissioners were placed into the record.

1. <u>Proposed Civil Penalty Settlement and Order: PCA Apparel Industries, Inc., sleepwear, CPSC Docket No. 94-C0011 OS# 5755</u> (Due 5/10/94)

The Commission voted unanimously (3-0) to provisionally accept the settlement agreement and order containing a civil penalty in the amount of \$75,000. Unless a commenter asks the Commission not to accept the Settlement Agreement and Order within 15 days after publication in the <u>Federal Register</u>, the Agreement and Order will be deemed finally accepted on the 20th day.

2. <u>City Council of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Legislation to Require Carbon Monoxide Detectors in New Residential Buildings</u> (Due 5/24/94)

The Commission voted unanimously (3-0) to approve a response to Bob O'Conner, Councilman, City of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, supporting legislation to require installation of carbon monoxide detectors in new residential buildings.

3. <u>Guidelines for Residential Pool Barriers</u> (Due 5/25/94)

The Commission voted unanimously (3-0) approve issuance of the staff document "Guidelines for Barriers for Residential Swimming Pools, Spas, and Hot Tubs" as a Commission publication without change.

4. <u>1994 Regulatory Plan</u> (Due 5/31/94)

The Commission voted unanimously (3-0) to approve the draft 1994 Regulatory Plan, which includes a statement of the Commission's regulatory priorities and covers the most important significant regulatory actions the agency reasonably expects to issue in proposed or final form in fiscal year 1995.
