**MOTION TO QUASH NON-PARTY SUBPOENA**

Non-party Patrick M. Bass, through the undersigned counsel and pursuant to 16 C.F.R. § 1025.38(g), hereby moves to quash the subpoena served on him by U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (“CPSC”) Complaint Counsel on January 21, 2022. The grounds for this motion are set forth below.

Mr. Bass served in management positions and was the signing authority for thyssenkrupp Access Corp. (now known as TK Access Solutions Corp.), after it generally ceased operations and was considered to be a “legacy company” of a formerly related entity, thyssenkrupp North America Inc., while he also served as Chief Executive Officer of thyssenkrupp North America Inc., from January of 2015 until February 29, 2020. Mr. Bass is now retired.

At his departure from thyssenkrupp North America Inc., Mr. Bass did not retain documents pertaining to the Company and thus has no materials responsive to Complaint Counsel’s *subpoena duces tecum*.

Further, Mr. Bass was deposed in two prior civil litigation matters pertaining to the potential hazards that are the subject of the Complaint in this matter. These depositions were given on September 11, 2012 (pertaining to the incident described at Paragraphs 67-73 of the Complaint) and June 14, 2018 (pertaining to the incident described at Paragraphs 74-75 of the Complaint).

These depositions, which were necessarily more contemporaneous to all of the issues in the above-captioned matter than current testimony would be, involved the same issues as the instant action. These depositions are thus the best available evidence regarding Mr. Bass' knowledge of topics including, but not limited to:

- the design, manufacture, and distribution, through dealers, of the Company's residential elevators;
- the Company's knowledge of locations in which its dealers or their agents installed the elevators;
- the Company's instructions for professional installers' installation of its residential elevators;
- the "Gap Space" adjoining a residential elevator installation;
- the potential hazards associated with excessively large "Gap Spaces;" and
- the Safety Codes applicable to residential elevator installations at the time the Company offered products.


Any current testimony could only be duplicative of Mr. Bass' prior deposition testimony. Upon information and belief, Complaint Counsel has received copies of the complete transcripts of these depositions, with exhibits, and thus has access to this best-available evidence.

As Mr. Bass can provide no documents or additional information responsive to Complaint Counsel's subpoena, the burden of complying with that subpoena would necessarily be disproportionate to its evidentiary value. Moreover, that burden would fall on a person who is not a party to this matter. Non-parties to any litigation "have no dog in that fight. Although discovery is by definition invasive, parties to a law suit must accept its travails as a natural concomitant of modern civil litigation. Non-parties have a different set of expectations. Accordingly, concern for

the unwanted burden thrust upon non-parties is a factor entitled to special weight in evaluating the balance of competing needs.” Cusumano v. Microsoft Corp., 162 F.3d 708, 717 (1st Cir. 1998), citing Haworth, Inc. v. Herman Miller, Inc., 998 F.2d 975, 978 (Fed. Cir.1993); Dart Indus. Co. v. Westwood Chem. Co., 649 F.2d 646, 649 (9th Cir.1980); Addamax Corp. v. Open Software Found., Inc., 148 F.R.D. 462, 468 (D.Mass.1993). See also Nitsh v. DreamWorks Animation SKG Inc., No. 5:14-cv-04062, 2017 WL 930809, at \*2 (N.D. Cal. Mar. 9, 2017) (citing United States v. Columbia Broadcasting Sys., Inc., 666 F.2d 364, 371 (9th Cir. 1982) where the court stated, “Nonparty witnesses are powerless to control the scope of litigation and discovery, and should not be forced to subsidize an unreasonable share of the costs of a litigation to which they are not a party.”).

For the foregoing reasons, Mr. Bass respectfully requests the Presiding Officer to quash the subpoena.

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
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
